UIDEO REVIEW: JUMPMAN

the latest compu game to follow in those ape-sized footsteps of Donkey Kong. You, as disarm all the bombs on a space station simply by

touching them. HOWEVER, little dots slow move across the screen until they draw a bead on you, then they zip across the screen at on you, then they spi across the screen at you! They are easy to avoid, as long as they aren't too close when they take light. At other times, characters that look like you, can kick you off the screen, but you can't hurt them. There are also large blocks that make you jump (sometimes of the edge), robots, hallstones, and another deadly dozen or so.

Technically there are 30 screens, but as some bombs are disarmed, parts of the screen changes, so there are actually more than 30 changes, so there are actually more than 30 screens. Eight speeds from super fast to painstakingly slow offer more challenge. The beginner setting allows play of levels 1-8; intermediate, levels 9-18; advanced 19-30.

When the final level is reached, fireworks

o off as the just completed structure flashes he Grand Loop option allows play straight through all levels as long as all six lives aren't lost. Extra jumpmen are attainable every 10,000 points. Randomizer starts off at level 12 with "Robots II" and then randomly picks out other levels. When all jumpmen are gone. the screen crumbles apart.

The game features a high score save-to

disk feature and up to 4 people can play. For those that don't have enough memory for Jumpman, or don't have a disk drive, Epyx is coming out with Jumpman Jr. on cartridge, with considerably fewer features.
