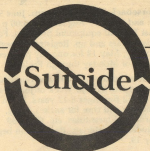

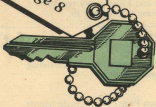


Mr. George Kearney, pictured here in 1965, reminisces about 22 years teaching in Collier County. See page 4.

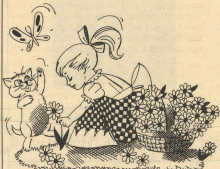
## Sugar & Spice Pageant

# Teen Suicide

Every 90 minutes in America, someone between the ages of 15 and 24 commits suicide. That adds up to 5,800 lives a year - triple the rate of 30 years ago. This makes suicide the third leading cause of teenage deaths, after accidents and homicides. It may be number one. Some suicides are mistakenly classified as accidental. Coroners sometimes do this to help "protect" the family, and many experts suspect that many single passenger auto deaths may be suicides in disguise.

More males successfully commit suicide than females. Chances are that the teenager who kills himself is a white male. Although four to eight times as many young women attempt suicide, young men actually pull it off much more frequently. Around 80% of teenage suicides are boys.

There is no one reason why a person would take his own life. Certain life stresses have been reported to precede a suicide: parental divorce, remarriage, the break up of a love affair, a geographic move, the suicide of a friend or a family member, and family alcoholism. Although suicide is often attributed to a single cause, it is never so simple. It is the end result of a complex interaction of personal, social, psychological, and possibly biological factors that tighten around a person like a knot.

Biologically there have been new studies that indicate that some suicide victims had experienced and survived adverse conditions before and at birth.

One group of U.S. researchers now believe that the moment of birth sets the stage for later suicide. The psychologists found that 60% of young suicide victims had mothers who were sick during pregnancy or had traumatic births. The trauma left the infants vulnerable to the psychological problems that can lead to suicide.

Another alarming problem with teenage suicides is the threat of suicide clusters. Recent studies show that suicide could be contagious. In a 12 month period beginning February, 1983, seven teenagers in Plano, Texas, committed suicide: four by carbon monoxide poisoning, three by guns. Researchers know very little about cluster suicides. Some may be merely coincidences; others may be self-dramatizing efforts to capture the same outpouring of sympathy that surrounded an earlier death.

There are effective ways to help stop them. One is communication. Parents that can talk to each other usually can pass this trait to their children. But, if a teenager looks withdrawn, a parent should ask in a sympathetic way, "Is something

bothering you?" A statement such as, "Snap out of it, will you?" does not work. It will only make them regress more. A teen will usually talk to an eager and persistent parent.

There are now some 300 suicide prevention centers throughout the nation. In the North Shore of Chicago, young social workers are sent into schools and community hangouts - school lounges, gymnasiums, even hamburger joints - to meet and talk to kids in informal situations. Their "drop in" counselors are available just to talk with people, one on one or in a group.

Other forms of prevention include the use of trained mental health teams, and often seminars and counseling programs for students, parents, and school personnel.

Certain situations are more likely to trigger underlying emotional problems; for example: loss of a loved one - a parent, friend, or boyfriend/girlfriend; a major disappointment or humiliation - either real or imagined; lack of communication - especially with parents about feelings of unhappiness, loneliness, isolation, failure, and frustration; inability to compete - in school, in a job, or in society; lack of a stable family life - in a home disrupted by tension, discord, or alcohol or drug abuse.

Certain behaviors may indicate suicidal tendencies: radical personality changes such as persistent sadness, loss of interest in usual activities; feelings of guilt, worthlessness, and helplessness; withdrawal from family, friends, and regular activities; noticeable changes in eating or sleeping habits or energy level, or neglect of personal appearance; falling grades or a decline in the quality of schoolwork; difficulty in concentrating; violent or rebellious behavior, drug or alcohol abuse; physical symptoms often related to emotional disturbances such as stomachache, headache, or fatigue; thoughts expressed of despair, death, or suicide; suicide attempts, even those that are meant to fail.

A teenager who is planning to commit suicide may also give verbal hints, statements such as "I won't be a problem for you much longer" and "nothing matters;" or, putting affairs in order, giving away favorite possessions, throwing things out; and suddenly becoming cheerful after prolonged depression - the final decision has been made, which is in itself a form of relief.

## Beauty/ Modeling Tips

Carol Rasberry from the Modeling Connection has these hints for brushing hair.

Do you know that brushing isn't always good for your hair? It all depends on how you brush, how long you brush and the kind of brush you use. 25 strokes a night is the absolute limit. Prolonged brushing can cause damage and hair loss, especially if the brush is too heavy or has pointed bristles, or if your brush strokes are too forceful.

The best way to brush is to bend over at the waist letting the hair hang low. Begin by brushing from the nape of the neck forward, brush back to front, then side to side using continuous strokes and going from the roots out to the ends. If your hair is very long, brush half way down its length, then hold the brushed hair against your head and complete the brush stroke out to the ends. When the whole head has been brushed, straighten up and throw the head back. Once the hair settles down, use your brush lightly to smooth out the surface.

Daily brushing is an important part of hair care.

## Robert Berrios

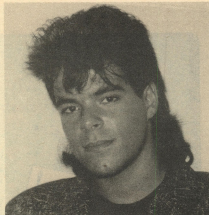

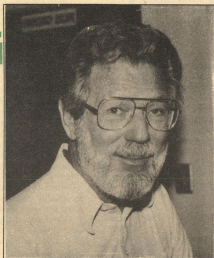

# George Kearney

He walks with a broken stride. He speaks slowly, thinking about every word. He is known for rigorous English assignments, his infamous sayings, and life stories.

As Naples High celebrates 25 years of educating Collier County youth this year, Mr. George Kearney celebrates 22 years of teaching English in Collier County: 4 years at Barron Collier, and 18 at Naples High. At 59, Mr. Kearney is retiring.

He attended Buchnell University in central Pennsylvania, F.S.U., Penn State, and New York University. He has BA and MA degrees.

When he moved to Naples 22 years ago, Mr. Kearney said that, "most of the students were from a lower economic class. The town consisted of fishermen and small mptel owners, but mostly fishermen." Now he says, "the student body drips of money." It is not unusual to see Corvettes, Mercedes, Trans Ams, or even Porsches in the student parking lot. "Lovable, gentle, and spoiled rotten," he says affectionately of the students.

Stroking his silver-grey beard, Mr. Kearney reminisces: "The worst era was during the Viet Nam war. Students were angry and the administration picked on them about their hair and the dress code." There were student protests and walkouts. "It was a pretty miserable situation. I came about as close to quitting as I have ever been. There was too much fighting between the administration and students. I didn't want to check their hair, shirts, and belts.

"Everything changed rather suddenly. We stopped picking at the students. If we were to revert back to the rules of 15 years ago, half the students would be sent home for being improperly dressed. School has become much more liberal."

Mr. Kearney remembers Naples when people had to swim or sail to Moorings Beach. "From Moorings Pass north, you almost felt like Robinson Crusoe. There was no one there," he said softly.

George Kearney is not only a veteran English teacher, he is also a veteran of the military service. He fought in combat during World War II, starting as a private before being promoted to Captain. He re-enlisted during the Korean conflict.

During retirement he plans to build a 20-foot sail boat, do some gardening, traveling, hiking, and read novels. He hopes to take college art classes, and do some painting. His wife Barbara is a home economics middle school teacher. They have two children, Rob, 18, and Carol, 22.

Thank you, Mr. Kearney, for 22 years of making Naples a better educated place.

Naples High School has occupied four different locations since its beginning in 1928. Originally roll was called at a house near the corner of Fourth Street and 10 Avenue South, then at the Carver School on 10th Street, next at what is now Gulfview Middle School, and finally, in 1960, to its present home on 22nd Ave.

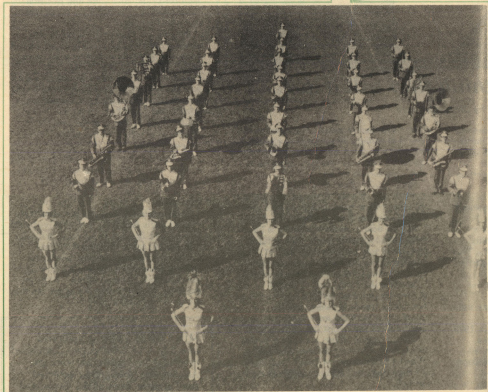

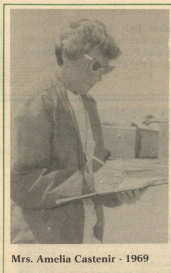

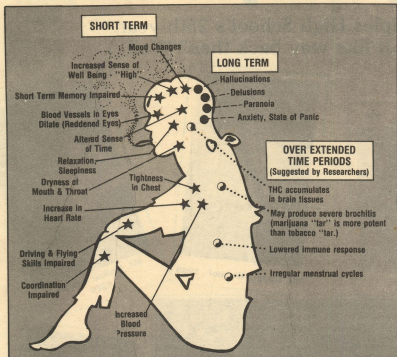
Jeff works part time at the hospital in the business office. He is able to choose his own hours.

## "Why do you think they call it dope?"

I can remember just six or seven years ago when Naples sported two so-called "head shops," stores or special sections set aside to sell pipes, papers, clips, and exotic paraphernalia all designed to aid in getting high on marijuana. Selling drug paraphernalia is now illegal.

Even though marijuana has been around for thousands of years, and even used medicinally and as an intoxicant, mass consumption as seen now in the United States didn't really start until the '60s. That surge of marijuana use swelled and carried over into the '80s. It is estimated that well over 20 million Americans consume the weed.

Because use is so widespread, many users are fooled into thinking that it is a relatively harmless "natural" herb. In 1970 it was reclassified from a narcotic to a hallucinogen by the Uniform Controlled Substances Act, and penalty for possession was reduced from a felony to a misdemeanor. Indeed, in 11 states it is no

longer criminal to possess it for personal use. It is commonly accepted at parties and in social situations, and has a special appeal for teens. However, here are some facts everyone should know:

Some studies show that marijuana potency has steadily increased over the last 20 years - some marijuana has twice the THC content as that smoked in the 60s.

A great deal of street marijuana is laced with unknowns, like herbicides. Inferior marijuana may be beefed up with PCP or cocaine. Bizarre contaminants from hair spray to animal feces have been reported.

Smoking dope may lead to sexual depression, lowered fertility rate, feminizing trends in males (due to interference with the male hormone), and a disruption of the menstrual cycle in girls.

Other physical effects are shown in the illustration. For more information, the library has a number of books, and there are organizations listed in the boxed area for help.

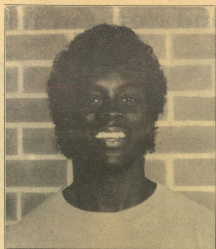

## Dungeon Master's Corner

What exactly is fantasy gaming? It is just like playing James Bond or Star Trek - you imagine you are Captain Kirk, you imagine you are battling alien beings - but it is only a game - that stimulates the imagination. In Dungeons & Dragons certain characters have the ability to use magic, but there are no written or oral "spells." You simply announce "I want to use my invisibility spell," then roll the dice to see if it worked. It is an exercise in strategy, logic, and imagination.

In an average game, your party (3 to 6 players playing 1 or more characters each) sits around a table. My Dungeon Master (DM) likes to use the imaginary "Steady Dragon Inn" as a meeting place. The imagination takes it from there. You are sent on a quest by a local lord or even a king to try and recover an ancient artifact, his daughter, priceless gems, or whatever else the game module describes.

Frequently you are sent out to destroy something or someone evil, or to counteract an evil that has fallen upon the land. Character alignments can be from lawful good all the way to chaotic evil. Most players run characters that are either neutral or tend toward the good side. Periodically someone will choose a character of evil alignment, but not very often. DMs do not like evil characters, so they are short-lived. Some characters can only be of good alignment as the paladin whose sole purpose in life is to wipe out evil.

As the game continues, you travel through marshes and swamps, deserts, visit small and large towns and castles, forests, etc. on your quest. Depending on your level, you will meet various types of assorted monsters and nasties that want to keep you from completing your quest. How powerful they are depends on the level of the module. Usually they are all of evil alignment and you are out to do them in.

As the game progresses, you will end up in a dungeon or an underground cavern. Then the fun really begins. There is where you run into all sorts of traps and underground monsters. You must be very careful - so as not to be killed. If you survive, the game is usually over. A dungeon has treasures and magical artifacts. This is how your character advances in level of experience and ability by killing monsters, acquiring treasure, and obtaining various weapons.

Each character starts out a level 1 or 0. I have heard of players here in Naples starting out at level 10, 20, etc, and even one with a character of 275th level after only 6 months. I have been playing for 5 years and my highest character is only 23rd level. To move up a level, you must accumulate a certain amount of experience points figured out by how many opponents you defeat, how many monsters you slay, how much treasure, etc. you accumulate, and how well you play the game.

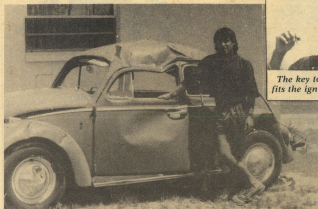

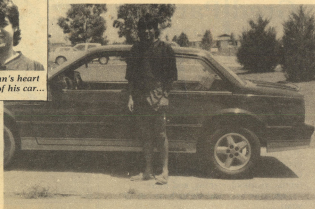

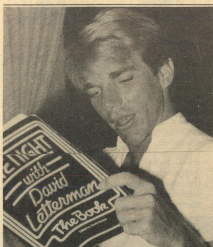
David's career path is strictly on the job training - no special schooling! He worked for WEVU while still in high school, in the technical end of the business, then moved over to WSGL before his current positions.
